Executive Summary

Yashoda Girls' Arts & Commerce College was founded on August 1, 1992 to cater to the local demand for a Girls' College. Since the date of its establishment the college has marched forward thoughtlessly to fulfill its goal of promoting female education in this part of the suburb and shaping its students into citizens of calibre and character through various academic, literary, cultural activities and periodically organized events. The college is recognised under 2(f) & 12(b) of the UGC.

CRITERION – I: CURRICULAR ASPECT

Being an affiliated college to Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj Nagpur University, Nagpur, the college does not have the autonomy of framing the syllabus. However, every effort is taken by the college for effective delivery of the curriculum. The IQAC in particular directs and supervise with faculties for curriculum enrichment and effective use of ICT. Student centric learning and organising events, including group discussion etc. are put in place. Educational Excursions and Tours are organised. Proper practical classes in subjects like Home Economics and Commerce are conducted. The students are motivated by organizing seminars, workshops, expert talks, poster exhibitions and Yashoda Knowledge Series (YKS). The present core curriculum accessible to the students is as per the university prescribed norms. Whereas the college is having rich subjects of various options available to opt compulsory subject like Pali, Urdu, Arabic and literature also in the same faculty. Though there are no other career oriented courses presently offered by the institution but skilled based Home Economics subject helps the students to move for self employment. The feedback on curriculum is obtained from the students. A Few of our faculty members are nominated on university Board of Studies.

CRITERION II: TEACHING, LEARNING AND EVALUATION

The college considers Teaching-learning to be the most important activity of the institution. The college aims at disseminating the message of Girls education in the rural area to improve the learning and existing standards of the rural students. Hence the students are admitted on 'first come – first serve' basis. As the admission process is on first come first basis, admission notice is displayed on College Notice Board and also students counseling are carried out in the rural area. The academic planning is designed before commencement of each session. Accordingly, various methods of classroom teachings have been introduced for learning process. In addition, an IQAC acts as a quality assurance mechanism to put in place in the form of regular check of the academic progress. The Women Empowerment Cell is conducting programs in regular intervals on Social,

Environmental and Health awareness. The respective teachers prepare annual department activities. The department of Urdu, Physical Education, Marathi and Pali has organised UGC sponsored seminar. The students' academic progress is analysed at remedial classes and after preliminary examinations. The implementation of this helps to understand the needs of the students and take care of the requirements in the following years. Awareness programs, such as gender awareness, environmental awareness, ICT awareness etc. are conducted by the respective committees/club set up in the college.

CRITERION III: RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

The Research Committee is constituted to monitor and address the issues of research. The committee invites proposals for Minor and Major Projects funded by the University Grants Commission or any other agencies. It facilitates access to research oriented activities like presentations of research papers at national and international conferences and publications of research papers in research journals of national and international repute. It also encourages and ensures enrolment and registration of our faculty members for Ph.D. Some recommendation of the research committee follows study leave for research work related activities, proposals of minor/ major research projects to be submitted by faculty members. The committee encourages faculty members to participate in organising seminars/ workshops/ conference. It also enlightens the faculty on the availability of research grants of different funding agencies. Some impact follows two teachers have completed and submitted their minor projects, twelve teachers are doctorate while two are pursuing and five faculty members of Political Science, Commerce, Marathi, Physical Education and English are research supervisor and some faculty members have published their research papers in peer reviewed journals.

CRITERION IV: INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

The college follows a policy of upgrading the infrastructure in the premises in order to facilitate the environment for effective teaching and learning. The college has been making enhancement to existing infrastructure as per requirements of increasing academic needs. The suggestions are made by the principal for extension, additions, up gradation of infrastructure and put before the Local Management Committee (LMC).Thereafter requisite decisions for purchase, extension, addition and modification of existing infrastructure are executed. Over the last four years the infrastructure of the institution has been upgraded. Modern technology is made available in most of the classrooms including computer laboratory. The College provides a number of infrastructure and other facilities to the students from the very date of the session, for example, a well-equipped library, Generator with 15 KV Capacity, UGC Network Resource Centre, Grievance Redressal Cell, Co -curricular activities. The College adopts several measures to secure bright future for the students. The institute tries to make the differentlyabled students secured. It ensures that the infrastructure amenities meet the requirement of the students with physical disabilities. The college has adequate numbers of computers for teachers and students, Internet facility is also provided, The library provide services such as OPAC, Reference Service, Reprography, ILL (Inter Library Loan Service), Information deployment and notification, User Orientation and awareness programs.

CRITERION V: STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION

The College has always been an initiated in providing support to students. The college has its prospectus published each year. The prospectus has information in detail about the courses that are available in the college, facilities available, fee structure, different committees are published. The college also has an academic calendar along with the prospectus. The calendar contains date wise information on the dates of internal assessments and exams, holidays, project dates etc. The College has a provision for scholarship, free ships for Arts and Commerce students, 100% of those students who submit their applications and come within the periphery of the government norms are applicable receive the same. The details of the support services / facilities provided are Remedial coaching, Book bank facilities, wash room on the ground floor, Travelling allowance is given to attend tournaments and competitions, Field and Industrial visits are organised for our students. The college brings out a magazine, 'YASHODHAN', with the contributions of articles from students. Annual Sports are organized by the college every year. Students are encouraged to take part in the events. Grievance Cell, Anti-Ragging and Anti Sexual Harassment Committee Members take care for any case, if any, within the college premises. The students who are at a higher risk of drop out are identified and special counselling is given to these students to reduce the dropout rate considerably. The feedback is obtained on various aspects such as academic, infrastructure, administrative, extra-curricular and co-curricular activities and about their overall impression of the institution. All committees functioning in the college make an effort to involve the students in organising programmes both in co-curricular and extra-curricular activities.

CRITERION VI: GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

The College practices the principle of quality enhancement and quality assurance through participative management. In addition, leadership is groomed through responsibility and accountability. The Governing Body, the Principal, the Faculty Members, and the Non-teaching Staff, the IQAC, together monitor the proper implementation of policies. The top management helps create an environment that is much needed for academic development. It encourages and supports. Autonomy is provided at multiple levels to promote decentralized governance system at the institution. The college is sensitized to latest managerial concepts like strategic planning, team work and decision making. Decentralized decision making is the key feature of the institution. The college has setup Career Counseling Cell and Placement Cell which invite Industry HRs/experts from various fields to deliver guest lectures and industrial visits are also arranged for students. The regular openings in company are intimated to the college in informal manner to conduct Placement Drive, Interaction with the students and Few Mock Interviews. The college realizes that both teaching and non-teaching staff should remain on the learning bend. Thus members of the teaching and non-teaching staff are allowed to participate in any professional development programme whenever and wherever the scope of such programme exists. The College gets financial support from various sources. The effective and efficient use of available financial resources of the college is ensured through a proper system adopted by the college. Accordingly, the college has been involved in brining students to the stream of socio economic development through education, control of gender bias and protecting the women learners as a priority. The decisions of the IQAC are taken only after considering various aspects of the problem and in detail discussion among its members. Most of the decisions were actually implemented.

CRITERIA VII: INNOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICES

It is a yearlong practice of the college to be friendly towards the environment. The College is committed to promote an ambience of creativity and is concerned with quality achieved through innovation. The college has constituted a Greenfield Club for the same. Women Empowerment has been a major concern of the College and the various departments of the college have undertaken the various programme. To enable development of physical, intellectual and moral capacities.

To provide students learning experiences to meet local and global challenges.

1.1.2 How does the institution develop and deploy action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum? Give details of the process and substantiate through specific example(s).

The institution always tries to ensure effective implementation of the curriculum as designed by the Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj Nagpur University, Nagpur. In order to sustain institution standards, the measures that have been deployed are as follows:-

The IQAC of the college prepares academic calendar in consultation with the college principal for effective implementation of the curriculum designed by Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj Nagpur University, Nagpur before the commencement of new session that includes dates of important events, Government holidays, summer and winter vacations, internal exams etc.

Principal holds a meeting with faculty members in the session in which examination plans, seminars to be conducted, appointment of temporary teachers, tentative time table, academic and co-curricular activities, new innovative teaching methods, framing a checklist of various community welfare programmes through NSS unit are thoroughly discussed so that institutions can provide something more innovative in the curriculum to compete at the natural and global trends of education

The Time Table Committee prepares the time table and displays on the notice board. The departmental teaching plan is prepared and faculty members take utmost care to complete the syllabus within the scheduled period according to the lesson plans. Extra classes are also taken to complete the assigned syllabus.

The faculty members also incorporate interactive classes, quiz, class tests, field visit, seminars, assignments, group discussions, power point presentations etc. along with lecture method to further ensure effective delivery of curriculum.

To ensure better understanding of the syllabus, extra classes are conducted. The ICT facility helps to acquire proficiency in teaching – learning procedure. Audio-Visual methods are implemented for better teaching-learning process, for example documentaries are screened by the Commerce, English, History and Marathi Departments to have better understanding of the subject matter.

The library is having OPAC system which is partially computerised. The students can search books in the library on their own. With changes in curriculum and syllabus the college procures books in library for use of both students and teachers. The Book Bank Scheme is initiated as an add on services for the needy students.

Feedback is obtained from the stakeholders and are monitored and evaluated by the IQAC for necessary remedial measures.

1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and/or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

The institution always tries to support the faculty members for effectively translating the and improving the teaching practices which are as follows:-

Though the curriculum is planned and designed by the university, our college follows a systematic teaching methodology to execute it. The college prepares academic calendar before the session begins. Every teacher prepares own teaching plan and unitizes it according to syllabus and time-table. Every teacher maintains Academic diary to record day to day teaching schedule, research, extension and other academic activities.

- At the beginning of the academic session an academic calendar is displayed on the notice board by the institution.
- Principal also interacts with faculty members for effective planning and implementation of curriculum.
- Every department constitutes Study Board comprising of Students' representatives. It provides academic platforms to students' fraternity. The Study Board organizes various academic activities like Guest lectures, Classroom Seminar, Group discussion, Quiz, Debate, Curriculum Based Poster Exhibition, etc. for all these the institute provides internal infra facility LCD, Smart board, Laptop etc.
- The minor financial assistance is also provided to conduct departmental educational tours and industry visits as organised by the teachers for the students.
- OPAC SOUL 2.0 software facilitates the teachers and students for Open Access to Library and other resources.
- The Librarian facilitates teachers in teaching and learning process by providing daily news paper cuttings record in the library. A good collection of journals and magazines.
- The college has all class rooms comprise of over head projector. This helps in teaching aids and create interactive atmosphere in the class for effective delivery of the curriculum.
- The use of innovative activity of using Internet based on prescribed curriculum, Email and reply to mails, web searching and generating email id of students is carried out from the Audio Visual Room provided by the college.

1.1.4 Specify the initiatives taken up or contribution made by the institution for effective curriculum delivery and transaction on the provided by the affiliated University or other statutory agency.

The effective measures for curriculum delivery and transaction on curriculum provided by the affiliating University are as follows:-

The respective departmental teachers monitor the completion of syllabus from time to time. In addition, Principal also interacts with faculty members for effective planning and implementation of curriculum. To make teaching more meaningful, charts, posters, diagrams, graphs, modern teaching equipments like LCD are used. The lecture method is supplemented with innovative teaching methods like class room seminars, tree diagram, points to remember (PTR) Quiz, discussions, visits etc.

Programmes are conducted regularly in the college; activities like guest lecture, essay writing, quiz, debate, and elocution are organized regularly. Personality Development Programmes are conducted in the college. The assessment of students is done through regular unit tests and preliminary examination. Continuous evaluation methods are followed by teacher by identifying slow learners and conducting class tests and home-assignments etc.

All teachers are evaluators of the University examinations of BA/B.Com. Educational Excursions and Tours are organised. The university notified practical classes in subjects like Home Economics and Commerce (assignments) are conducted. The students are motivated by organizing seminars, workshops, expert talks, poster exhibitions and Yashoda Knowledge Series (YKS).

The Library has good collection of books and Book Bank facility is also available for needy students. Students are enriched with expert lectures, seminars and for

attainment of knowledge. The curriculum of the College is delivered through careful planning and constant implementation. Various mechanisms and measures taken by the College ensure that the syllabus is taught within a definite time frame. The time-table and the Academic Calendar are two mechanisms that enable timely completion of the syllabus. Various measures are taken to accommodate the different needs of different learners. These include remedial lessons and counselling sessions.

• At present the College offers, as per the regulations directed by the Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj Nagpur University, Nagpur general courses of BA and B.Com.

The university newly prescribed syllabus for B. Com Second year in subject business communication word doc, excel and power point presentation are core part of the said subject. The students are given practical lesson in audio visual room. These skills are based on practical basis as horizontal support for the students.

• The College also organizes various co-curricular and extra-curricular activities to offer students an exposure to skill development opportunities. Student progress is monitored and evaluated through class test and preliminary examination. The formal feedback from

students and feedback received from other stakeholders groups enables the institution to constantly evaluate and re-work on the implementation of curriculum.

• All these measures ensure the holistic development of students through appropriate deployment of curriculum, as envisioned in the mission and goals of the institution.

- 6. Remedial/Extra Coaching Classes
- 7. Organising Job Fair

The college has formed various committees to help integrate the cross cutting issues such as gender, environmental education, ICT etc. The institution engages its students in the following programs on the cross-cutting to facilitate holistic education of its students. The committee includes Women's Empowerment, Academic, Anti Ragging, Anti Sexual, Students Grievances and Greenfield Club Committeess. The women's empowerment cell takes care of issues related to gender biasing, anti sexual harassment etc. The Greenfields club takes care of bringing about awareness among the students and faculties to work towards a greener environment. There is also a plastic free zone in the campus. There is Audio Visual Room in the college that helps students to familiarize themselves on technologies. Some of the institutional activities' include Artificial Flowers, Detergent Items, Infant Clothes, Fabric Painting, Brush and Block Printing, Spray painting programs (Tie and Dye) through Home Economics department. Programs on Pre-Marriage Counseling, Adolescent Problems and observance of Women's Day through Women Empowerment Cell are conducted. The awareness on ecological issues is done through assignments / projects work. The NSS organises community outreach programs, other social welfare programs, Health Awareness Programs and Blood Donation Camp and Pathological Test in regular intervals.

1.3.4 What are the various value-added courses/enrichment programmes offered to ensure holistic development of students?

At present the college doesn't have value add courses but has tried to enrich the students by conducting holistic development of students through program such as: Moral and Ethical values –

• The Placement Cell organizes lectures, placement drive, self employment and other skill-based workshops are also conducted by department of Home Economics. However, no regular skill based curriculum courses are conducted.

- Personality Development Programmes.
- Orientation and counselling on career and personality

Community orientation -

The institution is committed to social cause. The Department of NSS conducts various awareness programmes. Social Work programs/ activites are carried out through NSS students during the camp organised at the adjacent villages.

Teachers participate in the workshops and offer suggestions on the curriculum as and when organized by the respective BoS.

There is formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students on the curriculum. The department of English interacted with the Vice Chancellor along with the students of the university on English language curriculum. The suggested changes were accepted by the university which is being implemented from the current academic session 2016-2017.

TEACHING LEARNING AND EVALUATION

CRITERION II: TEACHING LEARNING AND EVALUATION

The College is affiliated to The Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj Nagpur University, Nagpur and follows the rules and regulations, curriculum designing and system of examination and evaluation set up by the University. The College provides an atmosphere of academic excellence, to facilitate creative skills, enhancing opportunities for further studies and promoting research activities through the able guidance.

2.1 STUDENT ENROLMENT AND PROFILE

2.1.1 How does the College ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

The college is running undergraduate course. As per the regulation of the University, details of admission process and admission policy (criteria for admission, adherence to the decisions of the admission committee, equity, access, transparency etc.) are published in the prospectus. The institution aims at spreading the message of education in the rural area to improve the educational and living standards of the rural students. Hence the students are given admission on 'first come - first serve' basis. To begin with all the inhouse students (i.e. those students who have passed standard XII - Arts from the junior college of our institution) are admitted on priority.

Publicity:

The prospectus of the college provides the admission procedure in detail for the students. Notices regarding admission to courses are also put up on the Notice Boards of the college. Banners regarding admission to B A / B Com courses are displayed at prominent places in villages. To begin with, admission forms and the prospectus are issued. The college displays the schedule of admission on its notice board along with the list of documents required. Thereafter the students submit the duly filled in forms and documents. The admission committee is formed. The committee supervises and ensures the smooth admission process.

Transparency:

The Admission Committee of the college comprising the Principal, faculty members and staff take utmost care in the preparation of admission list. The admission list is prepared on the basis of first come first and the same is displayed on the college notice board. For B.A and B.Com courses, the College strictly follows the norms specified by the University regarding admission. Programme wise admission processes of the College are as follows:

Campaigning:

The College aims at disseminating the message of Girls education in the rural area to

improve the learning and existing standards of the rural students. Hence the students are admitted on 'first come – first serve' basis.

For all in-house students applying for admission for the B.A course is admit if they apply within the stipulated date. Thereafter, admissions on first come first serve basis are done. To ensure transparency, all admission related information is displayed on college noticed and also the same is informed to the Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj Nagpur University, Nagpur.

Criteria for Admission-

Program / Courses:

Admissions to the Courses (B.A/B.COM) are based on the minimum marks obtained in the qualifying examinations (i.e. Higher Secondary Examinations of respective streams). The Admission Committee counsels the students in selecting their optional subjects in arts streams. From 2015-16 sessions, as per university directive all admissions were done through its online system. The University has implemented online of enrolment, examination and result for the under-graduate courses in affiliated colleges.

The college follows the reservation policy of the Government of Maharashtra for SC/ST/OBC & Minorities.

Preferences (if any)

The students are preferred for admission based on Sports, Cultural, Differently-abled, etc.

It is the only Girls College off the National High No – 07, the road which further links to villages ease the students to opt for an admission. The college has not fixed minimum percentage [cut-off] of marks for admission at the entry level. The college is most sought after amongst rural girls coming from disadvantaged sections. Keeping this in mind, the maximum cut of marks remains comparatively low than neighbouring colleges. However, it is clearly apparent from the above table that maximum percentage of marks obtained by the students is relatively more. It is also worthwhile to mention here that B.Com stream has shown balanced growth in admission due to good result.

2.1.4 Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually? If 'yes' what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

Yes, there is a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually. After the completion of admission process, the Admission Committee and subject teachers review the overall admission process. Efforts are being initiated to bring out necessary changes in admission from the next academic session 2016-2017. The college has a mechanism for analyzing the student's profile. This analysis is done using admission software. The profiles generated by this software are scrutinized by the principal.

A diverse range of students, irrespective of their varied economic, cultural, religious, linguistic backgrounds are admitted in our institution every year. Since the institution is meant only for female candidates from its very inception, therefore, the question of gender diversity does not arise.

The trend of demand ratio is on slightly decrease is mainly due to more course options being available to students. In the recent past, the University has allowed several colleges to start self financing courses. This credited to the establishment of new courses in the surrounding areas. However; the college authority has taken the matter under consideration in view of improving the scenario.

2.2 CATERING TO STUDENT DIVERSITY

2.2.1 How does the Institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

Differently-abled students are identified and the College does its best to support them in terms of physical facilities, library facilities and other curricular and co-curricular participation. Apart from regular facilities college has recently fixed hand bars to reach on First and second floor classrooms (*includes office and Library on first floor*). The menial Staff helps the differentlyabled students wherever possible. As of now the college has not received any major disability application for admission to the courses.

2.2.2 Does the Institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the Programme? If "yes", give details on the process.

The institution does assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills once they are admitted to the stream. The teacher of each department helps the students with

proper counselling. The teacher makes personal contact with students and identifies their problems and suggests solutions to them. Students also take help from the Career Counselling Cell in the College. The efforts are made to understand the academic competence of students and select teaching methods accordingly. Teaching innovative practices help students to understand in short and simple exercises.

2.2.3. What are the strategies adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students (Bridge/Remedial/Add-on/Enrichment Courses, etc.) to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice?

To bridge the knowledge gap of students following strategies adopted by the college:

- Remedial classes / Tutorials are provided to weak students, according to their needs.
- Handout of the matter is provided to the students for most of the lectures.
- Use of audio-visual aids helps in theoretical learning.
- Eminent experts are invited from time to time for guest lecturers/ seminars/workshops etc. for enrichment of knowledge in various fields
- Yashoda Knowledge Series (YKS) is being initiated to bridge the knowledge gap of the students for shaping brighter tomorrow. With the commencement new academic session the respective teacher of the department displays the valuable information on the place reserved for the YKS. As of now four departments have executed the enrichment activity. That includes English, Home-Economics, History and Pali departments have displayed their subject wise and other valuable hand outs. The same is being in rotational method.

2.2.4 How does the College sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

A. Gender

- To sensitize issues related to gender, the college organises guest lecturers for students on issues related to women empowerment so that awareness is spread among students related to women equality & women rights.
- The college every year organizes awareness programs on Breast feeding, Breast Cancer, Dental Check, Blood Donation Camp which inculcates social responsibility to the students. Special lectures are delivered by the resource persons to create awareness among the students regarding health conscious of their family life.

B. Inclusion

• The college initiates visits to the marginalized sections of the society through NSS activities like homes for physically and mentally challenged people, Slum Areas, Old Age People, Blind School, etc. to sensitize staff and students on awareness of inclusion.

C. Environment

 A compulsory paper on Environmental Studies has been introduced in the curriculum for the students to create an awareness regarding environment and health. An initiative is taken for medicianal uses of plants, plastic-free zone, Kitchen Garden and green campus.

2.2.5 How does the Institution identify and respond to special educational / learning needs of advanced learners?

On the basis of students' response and interest in the classroom and through informal interaction between teachers and students a few can be identified as to be a little advanced from the others. After identifying such advanced learners, the respective subject teachers normally follow the practices mentioned below.

- University previous years question papers are provided to them to do their best in University Examinations by respective teachers.

The college introduces the following special arrangements to develop the academic performance:

- Repetition & revision of a topic.
- Encouraging students to participate in classroom interactions.
- Special attention is given in Tutorial classes.
- Personal guidance is provided for emotional support.
- Delivering simple summary of the lecture.
- Using various teaching aids.

Irregular attendance and poor response in the class are indicative of the students at risk of being drop out. Most of the students of our college come from vulnerable socio-economic backgrounds. Many of them are also first generation college students. Those who do not perform well are personally counselled with a view to helping them to perform better academically. Attendance is noted and teachers make a note of students who remain absent for lectures. In parent teacher meeting the absentees of the ward are brought to the notice of parents.Remedial teaching is imparted to the weak students and they are prepared to appear for the next examination with more confidence. Such students are also repeatedly reminded to attend classes regularly and to work seriously in a focused manner in order to get good results.

2.3 TEACHING - LEARNING PROCESS

2.3.1 How does the College plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)

The college has a process where in the academic plan for the year is prepared and the session is commenced based on the same. The faculties are asked to give their part of input for the preparation of academic calendar. This academic calendar once prepared is circulated among the teaching staff and displayed on notice board. The process follows:

Academic Calendar:

- The College prepares its own academic calendar inaccordance with University Academic Schedule.
- Teacher Council Meeting is held in regular intervals or as required in which decision related to curriculum pedagogy, time table, exams, tests etc. are taken.
- Every teacher is supposed to give account of month wise course completion.
- The Time table works as a guideline for carrying out teaching learning process.

Teaching Plan:

- Daily Notes/Diary is maintained by all the faculty members.
- Apart from regular lecture sessions, assignments, guest lectures are provided to students on timely basis.
- Each paper is divided into four units. Each unit takes 01 to 1½ months to complete depending on the complexity and dimensions of the topic.
- Topics are explained in detail with links and examining bend.
- A few faculty members screen the ppt of their content to the students.
- Visits to book fair, places of subjects wise visit by department includes Commerce, Economics, Pali, Home Economics, History and English.

Evaluation:

- The Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj Nagpur University, Nagpur directions are followed while evaluating students.
- The syllabus and question paper pattern is communicated to the students in the beginning of the academic year by respective teachers.
- Preliminary Question papers are set by the faculty following the patterns provided by the University.
- Time Tables for all examinations are displayed well in advance on notice boards.
- Annual Examination by University is held at the end of academic session.
- The class tests / internal assessment are done as per academic schedule.
- Practical internal evaluation is done on the basis of their performance in class throughout the session, their attendance, their submission of assignment / works in time.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching-learning process?

The IQAC guideline help in knowing the difference between ideal quality of education and existing quality and it helps to reduce or minimize the gap between the two.

• It helps in making teaching learning process more effective and goal oriented through innovative strategies.

- It has facilitated the enhancement of infrastructural facilities in terms of equipment, lab, libraries etc.
- It encourages the faculty to do professional development training programmes, research activities and interdisciplinary programmes.
- It facilitates in organizing seminars, workshops, conferences which enhance overall academic growth.
- Substantial effort has been put by IQAC to ensure an environment of excellence in all aspects of teaching and learning by following ways:
- It evaluates programme wise result of final exam and suggests necessary remedial measures.
- Feedback of students, parents and alumnae is critically analyzed to take initiatives on corrective measures
- Language lab has been set up to supplement communication gap. Presently it works to help the students on basic skills.

All possible efforts are made to ensure that pleasant development of personality takes place and their energies are channelized in a constructive way. The Support system and Structure available for Faculty are as follows:

- A process of conducting of inter departmental lectures are also encouraged.
- The College library has open shelf system for easy access of various books.
- The departments provide facilities for encouraging Innovative Teaching Strategies (e-learning rooms).
- The College has a well equipped laboratory for Home Economics subjects.
- The College has a rich library. It has multiple copies of books in all disciplines. Besides this there are separate sections for Reference Books, Encyclopaedia, Journals and News Dailies also.

The college promotes a student-centric learning atmosphere in the college. This is done through the following:

•Interactive learning:

The faculty promotes and encourages the use of digital gadgets in-class room with dissemination of study materials:

- Group Discussion
- Guest Lecturers / Lecture Series
- Quiz/Question /Answer
- Educational Videos

•Collaborative learning:

To support the academic knowledge of the students, the teachers encourage them to attend the value added programs to facilitate collaborative learning:

- Students' Seminars
- Group Presentation
- Educational tours

•Independent learning:

The College has adequate library facilities for enriching knowledge and keeping oneself updated with the world outside. Class assignments and individual participation in sports activities also enhance independent learning. The College tries to develop the personality of the students by bringing radical changes in them. It focuses on attitude, aptitude, value systems, communication; writing skills, interview skills etc., so that students emerge as better individuals.

- Laboratory work (Individual/group)

2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

The college seeks to nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators through providing following opportunities:

• Critical Thinking:

Besides class-room lectures questioning method are implemented to test the student' understanding and learning. They are given topics on current issues in-house cultural events and inter-college competitions which help the students to develop their logic skills, analytical skills as well as decision making abilities. Students are given topics and issues on which they are asked to prepare projects or assignments. Besides the prescribed subjects, 'Environmental Studies' has been made compulsory for all Second Year Students. They are asked to choose a topic and elaborate it with their ideas.

• Creativity:

The College promotes creativity amongst students by encouraging them to publish materials in the College magazine and Wall magazine. A major publication of the College is *'YASHODHAN'* the annual College magazine comprising of different languages and subject section. This magazine enables our young writers to taste the excitement of having created something out of their imagination/intellect and provides them a platform for giving an expression to their creative urge. Creative endeavours like articles, stories, poems by students find a place of prominence in the magazine. The students of Home Economics department stalls are set-up during the time of annual social gathering where students can exhibit their creative thinking. Almost all the departments actively engage themselves in arranging various types of academic and cultural events like quiz, curriculum based exhibition, paper-reading, debates, etc. that help the students in cultivating and redefining their personality. In addition to this, the college takes special efforts to instil and nurture creative and scientific temper among the learners.

- To participate in State/ National/ International Seminar, Conferences and Workshops and also organize the same the college.
- To apply for research projects from State/ National funding agency.

Exposure of Students to advanced level of knowledge and skills:

- Seminars, Lecture Series, Workshop, Expert Lectures provide an opportunity to the students for interactions and exchange of ideas.
- The college library is well equipped with library facilities. Students avail full utilization of available resources and enrich their knowledge and skills.

2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students benefitted) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counselling/ mentoring/academic advice) provided to students?

•Academic Support: The Head of the Departments and other faculty members look into the results and attendance of the students. Continuous departmental meetings are held to track the slow learners and improve them. Every month the concerned subject teachers prepare a list of students who need extra attention in terms of results and attendance. The teachers initiate immediate remedial action. Counselling is being provided to the weak students to give them emotional support. Remedial classes are being provided to these students to help with the syllabus.

•Special attention is given to the slow learners: The College conducts parent teachers meet whereby the parents get a chance to meet their ward's teachers and discuss their progress with them. This in turn provides them with the required academic support. The continuous and systematic efforts of the teacher aim at providing the right career guidance and academic advice to the students.

•Mentoring: The Career Counselling Cell renders help to the students by guiding them in the studies, career planning, setting goals etc. The mentors also address students' personal and psychosocial issues to make them feel more confident and composed. Mentoring records are maintained for each student which includes both personal and academic details.

•Psycho-social support: The Institution ensures counselling on career and psycho-social issues which is provided by a teacher and experts. The right counselling at the right time really helps and guides the students to proceed with confidence in their studies and career. The counsellor holds individual session with the students in need and group sessions are also being held for the students on personality development, journey to success, success and failure, Stress Management and Time Management' for the benefit of the students.

2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching learning process?

The institution and the members of the faculty understand and emphasize the role of a library in augmenting the teaching-learning process. The College has a well-stocked library. The library provides open access facility to all teachers and partial access for students. New additions to library happen every year. Library also has internet connectivity. The College library also subscribes to various international and national journals by which faculty get latest content development occurring here and elsewhere. Previous years question papers are kept in the library. The college library organizes a book exhibition. This gives students and faculty a good exposure to a variety of writings. Teachers are encouraged to use the library services for teaching, preparing study materials and publishing articles while the students are encouraged to use the library for preparing and writing substance for their participation in co curricular activities like debates, Essay competition.

2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

The college follows the academic calendar of the University and tries its level best to complete the curriculum within the stipulated timeframe. However, unexpected loss of working days due to declaration of holidays by the district administration, strike, etc. creates hindrance, which is overcome by the faculty members by arranging extra classes.

2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

The quality of teaching-learning is monitored by the Principal and Teacher Council Members of the concerned departments and issues are discussed in the Teachers Council meeting. The monitoring process includes:

- Interaction of the Principal with students, Teacher Council Members and HODs.
- Continuous evaluation mechanism like classroom interactions, assignments, departmental seminar, class tests, quiz, assignment work, preliminary Examinations, final University examinations.
- The institution takes feedback from the students, alumnae and parents. The feedback is communicated to the teachers and suggestions given to improve their performance. The performance of the teachers is monitored continuously and reviewed.
- The institution arranges class tests and preliminary examination. Counselling is provided to the weak students to give them academic and emotional support. Remedial classes are provided to these students to cope with the syllabus.
- The institute monitor the College and University results of the students and evaluate the teaching-learning process.

2.3 TEACHER QUALITY

Recruitment of Faculty Members:

The Institution recruits qualified, meritorious faculty, with research potential through the Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj Nagpur University, Nagpur through constituted Selection committee.

Appointments of Guest Teachers:

To meet the requirements of faculty in various departments, guest/contributory teachers are provisionally appointed by the college in accordance with the terms laid down by the University.

Retention of Faculty Members

There is an encouraging environment in the college and the college extends full cooperation and provides a friendly workable atmosphere for retention of its faculty members. As part of salary and perquisites is concerned, it is paid as per the UGC norms and state government directives.

2.4.2 How does the Institution cope with the growing demand/ scarcity of qualified senior faculty to teach new programs/ modern areas (emerging areas) of study being introduced (Biotechnology, IT, Bioinformatics etc.)? It was intend to grow with the emerging trends/demands of economy so as to ensure that the graduates have adequate knowledge and skills to get suitably employed and, thereby, meet the economic and industrial needs. The project was submitted to the UGC based on Skill development courses/program to get ready an individual for Job/market fit. The college has not received the approval for UGC - KAUSHAL (Knowledge Acquisition Upgradation for Skilled Human Action and Learning) Scheme (2012 - 2017). And the college does not have those streams of study like Bio-technology, IT, Bio-Informatics etc. Therefore, no staffs have been appointed till date.

Our college management encourages teachers in their trained development in various ways:

- Duty leave is given to teachers for attending seminars, conferences and workshops.

Research Grants:

Seminar/Workshop

Leave

The college evaluates the performance of teachers by the students and external Peers. Evaluation of teacher's performance is done annually. The feedback system is evaluated by students through printed questionnaires relating to all subjects. Students evaluate their respective teachers on the basis of their teaching style and methodology. Feedback Committee monitor the feedback system and take appropriate corrective actions. In addition to this, external peers such as affiliated college teachers and others, feedback is obtained on teaching learning process methodology to be adopted in efficiently. Based upon these evaluations the quality of teaching and learning is improved accordingly.

2.5 EVALUATION PROCESS AND REFORMS

2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

Evaluation process plays an instrumental role to a student's personal and career front. The institution ensures that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the following evaluation process

Information to Students -

- At the beginning of the session the faculty briefs about the evaluation methods, university examination, Class Test and Preliminary Examination before the final University Examinations.
- Attendance and performance record is maintained for each student as the evaluation process is continuous due to which attendance and participation in the class is ensured.
- The college also helps the students to score better in the exams by showing them their answer sheets of the tests. This practice helps the students to understand where they stand in academics and ways to improve.

Information to Faculty -

- All notifications of the University about evaluation process are circulated to the teachers by the Principal
- Staff Council Meetings are held to discuss the latest evaluation methods and its implementation and the final constructive decision is taken which is conveyed through notice and also orally to the students.

Information to Parents and other Stakeholders -

• The college also conducts meetings with parents to tell them how their wards are performing in the academics and other activities. Parents are briefed about the evaluation methods followed during the Parent-Teacher Meet.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the Institution on its own?

The college has been following all the rules laid out by the university to conduct exams. However the college has a separate process for conducting class tests and preliminary exams. The students who require extra attention are identified based on the marks scored and they are helped out as necessary:

University Reforms adopted by the institution:

The evaluation reforms of the university are followed as when directed.

The University has introduced the Semester pattern from 2016-17 and it has been adopted by the college.

Initiated Reforms by the institution:

- For internal evaluation, the institution conducts Preliminary Examination.
- Remedial classes for the weaker students and special guidance for the advance learners are given in order to motivate them for better performance.
- Motivating students to attend the classes regularly.
- Handouts/Notes on syllabus related material are prepared by the concerned subject faculty.
- Previous year question papers are given to students by respective teachers for easy understating and better performance in University Examination as a question bank.

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

The college has an examination committee which ensures the smooth functioning of the examination process as per the guidelines of the University. The evaluation reforms of the university are followed systematically. The Institution strongly believes in continuous evaluation system which is implemented effectively. The evaluation is fair; the students are satisfied by showing them the evaluated answer scripts. Question papers are discussed in the class to improve their weak areas. Remedial classes are conducted as and when essential. Thus through the continuous evaluation system the student is made to read regularly, gain knowledge and also obtain maximum advantage in scoring higher marks.

2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative assessment approaches adapted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

As an affiliated college of the Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj Nagpur University, Nagpur we have adopted an evaluation system as per the guidelines of the University. Though university is the sole authority for implementation of reforms in examination and evaluation, the institution adopts both formative and summative methods of evaluation. Formative approach continuously monitors student's progress in a conducive learning environment. Both the approaches have positive impact on the evaluation system, because performance of a student is not only judged by the marks, but also by her other formative performances during the course. It measures the student's achievement and performance through the following:

- Attendance record
- Field visit
- Practical session
- -- CDs on Spoken English are shown in the intervals.

Summative Assessment:

-Class/Preliminary Test/Exam

- Internal Evaluation of Practical Records
- Projects/Assignments

All these methods have positively impacted the system since the students- Understand the subject well, get better results, develop confidence and independent personality, and gain knowledge which may ensure further studies, develop professionalism with respect to changing times.

2.5.5 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioural aspects, independent learning, communication skill etc.)

In ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment like class test and preliminary examination, the questions of the test examination are kept very carefully under the custody Examination Committee and examined answer scripts are shown to the students. The marks obtained for each test are recorded in a separate registrar supplied for each department. Through these tests students are made aware of the model question paper on the syllabus. Thus they are through free of examination phobia. The university has introduced Semester System from the current academic year 2016-17. The college takes every effort to ensure rigor and transparency in the internal assessment through as and when directed by the university.

Students can also apply photocopy of the answer booklet by paying photocopy fees through the University. The University authorities get the answer sheets re- evaluated and re-evaluation results is intimated to the college.



2.6.5 How does the institution collect and analyze data on student performance and learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?

The college has adapted formative and summative assessment processes. The college Examination Committee and IQAC also looks after the results of the students and makes sure the learning outcomes stated by the college are achieved. The college has also asked the faculties to take remedial coaching Classes for academically weaker students.

Collection and Analysis of Data

The academic progress of the students are collected and analyzed through class test, assignments, students' participation in departmental seminar and co-curricular activities, feedback of students and final result of University examination. The analyzed data act as a tool for the teachers to chalk out strategies towards overcoming different barriers of learning:

- The College has been collecting data on its pass out and their placement for the last few years.
- This data clearly demonstrates the effectiveness of the teaching learning process adopted by the College.
- Yearly University results are analyzed by the faculty and corrective measures are introduced wherever needed (Tutorials/ remedial)
- The College uses it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning by applying more effective learning strategies, more counseling, by implementing the College calendar, more objectively and categorically etc. which certainly helps in bringing effective changes.
- Feedback received from alumnae is also incorporated in improving quality of teaching.
- The examination committee and IQAC analyses the data on student learning.

- Weak students are given special attention by teachers through remedial teaching and their morale is improve, helping them to gain confidence in themselves and work hard towards their goals.
- Other activities conducted by departments such as competitions, seminar, quizzes and etc.

The above cite understanding, planning and overcoming barriers of learning are done through:

- Departmental meetings wherein teachers discuss and decide ways of solving problems that arise in the process of teaching learning.
- Remedial coaching: For academically weaker students, extra classes are conducted to improve their learning ability.
- Students' participation in college events debating, essay writing, curriculum based poster exhibition, quiz etc. help learners to develop their skills.
- Monetary assistance to students to participate in inter-collegiate events.
- Book Fair, Industrial visits and field visits are organized in order to give students an exposure to real life situations.

Academic:

Students are encouraged to speak up about difficulties in the choice of their subjects, in the class timings or any other academic issue. The students are open and approachable for extra help, academic counseling or other assistance required.

Personal:

The Student Counseling Cell holds a meeting as per the schedule where the issue of students' personal problems, difficulties if any in the college, needs, emotional, misunderstanding or any other need. To boost up the spirits and to make them aware, bold, safeguard etc experts lectures are organised to counsels the students.

Career:

Remedial coaching helps the students to step further. Most of the students come from the rural areas and belong to the lower middle class. There is a tendency of early marriage. The married girl students often discontinue their studies. The students are therefore motivated to get married at least after graduation and if possible after getting a job. This measure has yielded positive results and the students inform / request their parents not to arrange for their marriage before completion of their studies.

The students are full of worries, problems, confusions, shyness etc. We also realize that they are full of energy and enthusiasm which needs to be properly channelized college provides counseling services to students through its career counseling and guidance cell.

Academic and Career Counselling is done informally by the concerned subject teacher personal counseling and psycho- social counseling is taken care of by the respective class teacher and the Career Counselling Cell.

Psycho-Socio Counselling:

Student suffering from Psychological problems like inferiority complex, depression, anxiety etc. are treated patiently and kind-heartedly by the college. Economically Week student are counselled to get benefits of social welfare schemes of the Government.

A friendly relation between teachers and students has been the tradition of our college. Apart from the interface in classroom the students are positively engaged in contact with the teachers and discuss curricular and co-curricular matters with them. Some distinctive characteristics follow:

The college has been involved in brining students to the stream of socio economic development through education, control of gender bias and protecting the women learners as a priority. Few to narrate:

- By nurturing students in them values patriotism, responsible citizenship, commitment to human rights and a gender sensitive attitude.
- The college through its various activities enhances the confidence of the students.

Vision for the future:

The college make sure that the vision and mission of Institution is as per the ongoing need by offering the benefit of education to empowerment of women through education, offering traditional education and skill development programs, economic, social and educational empowerment of under privileged sections of society. The college lays special emphasis on widening the mental horizon of the students. For this, in almost all the meetings, gatherings, programs and functions, students are taught to respect other religions and cultures. To the realization of the vision and mission and to the achievement of objectives introduction of some new subjects/courses with importance on competitive and skill oriented programs has been thought in brining.

To fulfil the mission of the institution, the open admission strategy of the college, i.e. first come, first serve basis have make simplicity to the students the opportunity to follow higher education which otherwise becomes very difficult for ordinary students to get admission in the cut-throat competition and which is not affordable for them. Apart from providing formal education to the students, the college instructs skill, moral and value education which can be an asset in nation building. To supplement all these above efforts and integrate the vision into quality assurance scheme, dedicated faculty with modern infrastructure facility is available within the college.

- Assessing reports of teachers and maintenance of service books of teaching and non teaching staff.
- To be a link between management and staff

Role of the Faculty:

- To enrich the teaching learning and evaluation process.
- To undertake and motivate students to pursue research/projects.
- To provide inputs to the Principal in planning its activities to achieve.
- To promote academic excellence by upgrading the skills and knowledge.
- To be a facilitator in co-curricular and extra-curricular activities.
- To be a mentor to students.
- To be a counsellor.

6.1.3 What is the involvement of the leadership in ensuring:

- The policy statements and action plans for fulfilment of the stated mission-The various committees along with the Principal are committed to make out that the policy statements and action plans are appropriate with the vision and mission of the institution.
- Formulation of action plans for all operations and incorporation of the same into the institutional strategic plan-

Formulation of action plans for all activities of the institution and incorporation of the same into the institutional strategic plan is an important part of policy formulation of our institution. The Principal and various committees are actively engaged in formulation of action and implementation of the plans. The regular meetings are held to supervise the proper execution of the action plans.

• Interaction with stakeholders-

The college principal always welcomes the personal interaction with various stakeholders, the faculty, the non teaching staff, the guardians and even students which plays an essential role to know the outcome of various on-going academic or non academic activities and provide feedback for their more effective implementation. An individual interview with students, tutorial, meetings of parents, teachers, well wishers and alumnae and teachers of each department etc., ensure such interactions. The feedback also helps the college authorities for better planning and better execution of the undertaken job.

 Proper support for policy and planning through need analysis, research inputs and consultations with the stakeholders-

The college leadership provides proper support for policy and planning. New programs are initiated only after proper analysis of the needs and importance of

the proposed projects. The research inputs and facilities, opportunities for consultancy and extension etc. are discussed by a team and final decision is taken by the leadership in view of welfare of all stakeholders.

• Reinforcing the culture of excellence-

It is Principal, who can reinforce the culture of excellence in the college. The efforts taken by the Faculty members, administrative methods and the IQAC Committee play important role in this attempt. The college strives to create and maintain an environment.

• Champion organizational change-

The principal of the college is champion of organizational change in the college. She is a motivating spirit for the faculty and students of the college. She constantly encourages and guides all HODs and various committees etc. to achieve excellence in their respective fields. Her accountability ensure smooth running of the college which leads to quality enhancement and excellence.

The Governing Body, the Principal, the Faculty Members, and the Non-teaching Staff, the IQAC, together monitor the proper implementation of policies:

- Feedback from all the stakeholders is used in developing the Plan of the college.
- The Alumnae are involved and suggestions are also put for the consideration.
- Academic and other Feedback from all the stake holders is taken into consideration.

The top management helps create an environment that is much needed for academic development. It encourages and supports:

- The faculty is at the liberty to deal with the syllabus in its own way and has the freedom to adopt any teaching method, which it may deem fit.
- The institution promotes leadership at multiple levels for the faculties. The faculties work under the broad composition of academic calendar, but they can often take independent decisions on the session planning, mode of internal incorporation of ICT technologies etc.
- The participation of teachers in faculty development programs such as Refresher Course, Orientation Programme, seminars, conferences, workshops, etc are admissible. Leave is granted for pursuing of PhD
- Faculty members taking up research projects are encouraged to do so. They are provided with full support by the College.
- Interested departments are provided funds to organize seminars, guest lectures, field trips and other co-curricular activities.

• Any add-on activities such as study tours etc. are also planned by the department independently.

6.1.6 How does the college groom leadership at various levels?

The college tries to groom leadership by giving sufficient responsibility to teachers & Office Staff, Discipline Committee, Menial Staff and other committees.

- Through work rotation in different committees
- By sponsoring faculty for training programmes
- By inviting Resource Persons in various subjects to enhance their knowledge & skills
- By delegation of responsibilities to the faculty
- By grooming students to take up leadership roles through co-curricular and extracurricular activities.
- Programs are planned keeping in view grooming leadership skills and at the same time values of democracy, justice, liberty, equality and fraternity are also preserved.

6.1.7 How does the college delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the departments / units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?

Autonomy is provided at multiple levels to promote decentralized governance system at the institution. The college is sensitized to latest managerial concepts like strategic planning, team work and decision making. Decentralized decision making is the key feature of the institution such as:

- Administrative powers and responsibilities are delegated to teachers on the basis of their competence, commitment and aptitude to meet the institutional objectives.
- The principal provides necessary support to maintain all the plans.
- All the Department/ faculties are given full liberty and autonomy for taking decision regarding the arrangement and planning of expert lectures, seminars or workshop as per the requirement co-curricular activities.
- NSS Program co-ordinator are given freedom regarding the selection of the students, planning and arrangement of the program.
- The co-coordinators of the extension activities and other extra-curricular activities are given operational autonomy regarding the selection of the students, planning and deciding about expenditures of the program. They are provided full support and required fund by the college.

6.1.8 Does the college promote a culture of participative management? If 'yes', indicate the levels of participative management.

Yes, the various curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities are considered by the college management before getting it finalized. The feedback received from the stakeholder are analyzed and discussed. Steps are initiated to implement some of the ideas received from them. Teachers are generally accessible to advice-giving status in making decisions related to curriculum, teaching-learning and assessment processes. The non – teaching staff take care of the smooth running of the administrative system in collaboration with the teaching staff.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 Does the Institution have a formally stated quality policy? How is it developed, driven, deployed and reviewed?

The college is constantly focused on its vision, mission and objectives. The Principal deploys the policy with the help of teaching staff, members various committees and the administrative staff. In regular intervals reports are submitted by the teachers for improvement in the quality of teaching and learning program. The guest faculty and supporting staff is done for quality improvement. The Principal provides inspiration, encouragement and equipments and also appreciates the achievements.

Yes, the college does have a perspective plan for development. The college develops plans keeping in mind the needs of the students and the feasibility to implement the plan.

- Weight-age is given to undertake more student extension program like students' seminar.

6.2.3 Describe the internal organizational structure and decision making processes.

The college has its own decentralized internal organizational structure for decision making and decision implementation which is given below:

- The college usually plans for the development of the college is discussed in the governing body meetings and teacher council meetings. Major issues are solved and the matter is forwarded to the Governing body that has the final say in the decision.
- Minor decisions are usually taken by the principal himself who takes the help of the administrative body.
- The Principal of the institution takes decisions regarding day-to-day matters of the College in consultation with the Governing committee.
- Departmental Teachers takes the decisions with regard to departmental matters.
- Regarding the organization of co-curricular and extra-curricular activities, the decisions are taken by the respective committee coordinator along with the other committees / members.

6.2.4 Give a broad description of the quality improvement strategies of the institution for each of the following:

The quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution are as under:

• Teaching & Learning:

The college authority encourages the teachers to get them involved in learner centric teaching practices with a view to develop thinking aptitude among the students. Teachers are asked to make widespread use of power point presentation for enriched learning experiences of the learners. Efforts are made to make the students regular in their classes and to support them for learning more from the class rooms than from rote learning. To increase participation of students in class rooms, presentation on smart board, ICT based lessons are also augmented and important documentary films are screened occasionally. The faculties are also asked to attend the faculty development programs which will help the faculties to gain more knowledge about the skill sets required for teaching.

Research & Development:

The college promotes the value of research work among the faculty members. Teaching faculty is encouraged to do their research work, Ph.D. and some teacher have completed their doctoral work during their service. In order to promote research culture among the faculty and the students, the college has a research committee who motivates and circulate the recent information on the research proposals to take up research activities/projects etc.

• Community Engagement:

The college conducts extension activities that can be used as a booster for the students to become a responsible citizen. College takes up several cultural and social activities throughout the year in which community is involved. The college encourages students to take part in NSS and other extension activities. The Women Empowerment Cell organizes various outreach programmes to enable the students to respond to the larger issues of the society. Some of such activities taken up by college like tree plantation drive, cleanliness drive in college, prohibition on usage of plastic bags, blood donation camps, medical check-up, visit to old age homes, lectures on female foeticide and inter college competitions.

Human Resource Management

Human Resource Management is a very sensitive area. Where the College adheres to the principle of rigorous discipline but with warm human touch. The administration has developed mechanism to watch each and every employee closely at the same time it takes care to keep him/her at a comfort level, so that he /she could work efficiently to the maximum of his/her capacity.

- The faculty exchange their views for the improvement of teaching and learning strategies.
- A close watch is kept at learner's progress.
- In order to keep the spirit of healthy competition alive among the students, the incentives in the form of prizes and fee concession is given to students.
- There are many staff welfare schemes.
- By encouraging the faculty to attend state, national and international seminar.

• Industry Interaction:

The college has setup Career Counseling Cell and Placement Cell which invite Industry HRs/experts from various fields to deliver guest lectures and industrial visits are also arranged for students. The regular openings in company are intimated to the college in informal manner to conduct Placement Drive, Interaction with the students and Few Mock Interviews. Although we have no formal tie-ups with the industries yet we are planning to have links with some of the IT Industries in near future.

6.2.5 How does the Head of the institution ensure that adequate information (from feedback and personal contacts etc.) is available for the top management and the stakeholders, to review the activities of the institution?

In the academic of the session, the college principal instructs all teachers to maintain record of all the departmental activities. They are advised to keep record of the Unit tests and preliminary exams. Similarly, the teacher in-charge and the members of the various committees maintain record. The feedback by the students is also obtained in feedback Performa. The reports, committee meetings, functions and discussions with all stakeholders. The Management of the college has its representatives on various committees such as IQAC and the LMC. The Principal is the co-opted member of the management committee. The Principal communicates the feedback received from the staff and students to the Management regularly during meetings with the Governing committee. The reports received from various committees are forwarded to the management. Thus the Principal ensures that all necessary information is made available to the management.

6.2.6 How does the management encourage and support involvement of the staff in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional processes?

The college is set to move on improving the effectiveness and the efficiency of the institutional process. The teachers are asked to provide their inputs for improving the institutional process. Their inputs are considered and decisions are taken accordingly after the governing committee meeting where the final decision is taken.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

To enhance the professional development of teaching and non-teaching faculty, the governing body of the college provides various facilities such as:

The college realizes that both teaching and non-teaching staff should remain on the learning bend. Thus members of the teaching and non-teaching staff are allowed to participate in any professional development programme whenever and wherever the scope of such programme exists. Non teaching staffs are motivated to become familiar in computer application. Teachers are encouraged to participate in Orientation programmes,

Refresher courses, Short term courses, Faculty improvement programme to be updated in their respective disciplines. Teachers are encouraged to participate also in International /National /State Level Seminars/Workshops, University syllabus/ Examination which help them to enhance their professional knowledge and skill.

6.3.2 What are the strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform?

The college provides academic liberty. It organises awareness programmes and has a facility of downloading E-resources and improving development of language and communication skills. The college also provides an OPAC system in library. The College formed the IQAC in 31 March 2014. The IQAC makes a formal plan to maintain and sustain the high standard and quality education. It organises lectures, seminars, workshops and training program for students and staff.

6.3.3 Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

The institution has adapted the UGC-CAS framework to evaluate the faculties. This framework makes sure that as many details are collected about the faculties so that this information can be used for the appraisal of the particular faculties. The teacher is required to submit duly filled self-appraisal forms to the Principal through IQAC. Faculty appraisal is done by using feedback and self-appraisal forms.

6.3.4 What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?

The IQAC evaluate the performance of the teaching staff. Appropriate suggestions identified in areas are given by the committee and are reviewed for implementation in the Teacher Council Meetings. The Institution also takes the feedback from the students on teachers' teaching learning evaluation. The performance reports of the faculties are made by the Principal during the time of career advancement and promotion, and submitted to the screening committee for evaluation. The same are considered and are also communicated to stakeholders.

6.3.5 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non-teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years?

No Welfare Scheme is available for teaching and non teaching staff in the College. But, college only facilitate the staff to get bank and P.F loans.

The College does not have much scope towards attracting and retaining eminent faculty as recruitment procedure set with the norms and standard as laid down by the UGC, Government of Maharashtra and receives grant—in aid. The institution gives academic liberty to faculty members.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

The effective and efficient use of available financial resources of the college is ensured through a proper system adopted by the college. The admin put a note sheet for any expenditure to be made. The demand made by the concerned is checked and a call for quotation is issued by mentioning the required equipment or any. The principal with the assistance of accountant, Building Sub-committee and Purchase Committee make plans for utilization of the available financial resources. The Governing Committee endorses the plans. An utmost care is taken to use the available financial resources effectively and judiciously. A meeting of purchase committee is held on the receipt of the quotation/tenders. The Principal forwards the quotation recommended by the purchase committee to the management for final approval. Purchases are finally made on the approval and sanction of management. All the official formalities are monitored by the principal. The Head Clerk prepares voucher and make stock entry, issue cheques to the concerned firm/parties and the record is maintained.

6.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? When was the last audit done and what are the major audit objections? Provide the details on compliance.

The College Management has appointed an approved charged account auditor who audits all the income & expenditure of the college.

- The Government grants are also being audited by CA
- General audit of 2015-2016 of the Principal account was the last audit. There were no major audit objections in the internal and external audit.

No formal training is provided to the staff by the College for effective implementation of quality assurance procedures. However, the Principal motivates teachers in the Teachers Council meeting. Teachers are motivated to pursue more research oriented academic works and to upgrade and update themselves for imparting quality teaching. Office staffs are motivated to be well equipped with upgrade and updated technical knowledge and skill in the field of application of IT.

Day-to-day academic activities are reviewed by the principal. Teachers' Council also reviews the academic performance of the students and IQAC reviews and monitors career advancement of the faculties. In every meeting, the Governing Committee takes cognizance of the academic activities on the basis of Principal's report. External review is made whenever faculties apply for career advancement. The Principal is entrusted to act on the outcomes of the reviews.

The internal quality mechanism of the college is based on the guidelines given by National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC), Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj Nagpur University, Nagpur and office of the Joint Director of Higher Education and University Grants Commission (UGC). The proposal regarding request for grants from the UGC is approved by the Planning Board constituted for this purpose and the funds received are utilized as per the guidelines issued by the UGC.

- The guidelines given by the office of the Joint Director of Higher Education regarding salary grant, permission for starting of new courses, proper utilization of government grants etc. are complied.
- It is ensured that IQAC functioning is in the alignment of the requirements of external quality assurance agencies like NAAC, affiliating University, UGC and Joint Director's Office.

The institution continuously reviews the teaching learning process. The Structure, Methodologies of operations and the outcome are mentioned as under:

7.1.1 Does the Institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

The college shows its awareness and responsibility towards the environment management and it conducts a Green Audit of its campus and facilities through a constituted committee. We have planted and preserved more than 154 trees and plants on the campus. The number of plants and trees goes on increasing with our usual plantation and preserving it. Nurturing Plants is one of the non-academic searches that develop eco-concern among the students.

The 'Greenfield Club' creates awareness among the students about the importance of ecological balance, about maintaining greenery, planting trees, conserving water and electricity, about saving paper and proper waste management. An attempt is made to safeguard the three T's of waste management that is Trim, Try and Transform. The NSS volunteer supports the activity.

- The campus is kept neat and clean, lawn and plants are maintained properly.
- The interior design of the college naturally allows sufficient air inside the classroom.
- The students imbibe the values and the culture of nurturing the environment and atmosphere.
- On the event of *Swacha Bharat Abhiyan* cleanliness drive of organised in the premises.

• The Gardeners take care of the landscape and plants in the college.

7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus eco-friendly?

The college makes efforts to implant environmental awareness amongst its students. The ecological awareness activities such as rally (Vrushadindi), film screening (Vasundra), field visits (Ayurvan) and other activities are undertaken by the college. The initiatives taken by the college to make the campus eco -friendly are as follows:-

• Energy conservation:

Trim:

- Trees and plants have been sufficiently planted around the fencing area to provide natural aeration in the college. The purpose behind the same was to *Trim* the use of electricity like fans.
- There are standing instructions for the staff and the students to switch off all electricity when not needed.
- Students' representative on 'Greenfields Club' observes and applies this practice.
- Non-teaching staff members and peons have been deputed for the purpose of ensuring that all the lights, computers and other electric equipments are switched off when not needed or when the classes are over.

Try:

- One sides used paper is utilized for non-formal or rough work of the other side.
- Lectures are organised to teach the students the innovative ways of using used and waste material.
- Best out of Waste are trained to the students how waste products can be *Try* to reutilize effectively. Students make several useful items like pen-stands, storageboxes, gift-boxes, greeting cards etc by reusing waste material in novel ways.

Transform:

- The college Transform through a small compost pit for simple and free alternative in the backyard to dump all the waste in it.
- The Department of Home Economics place all its waste for the creation of a natural fertilizer. The recycling of kitchen scraps are dump in the compost pit and the compost are utilize for garden plants and kitchen garden.

• Non-teaching staff have been counsel to put brew a stuff of tea to put in compost pit. Tea Compost is used for kitchen garden and other places. It benefits the nutritional quality and improves the flavour of vegetables.

• Use of Renewable energy:

At present the college is not having options for attaining of renewable energy systems whereas the college is trying its best. Recently the college has sent a proposal to the UGC to grant a Solar Photovoltaic System on the rooftops.

• Water harvesting:

The proposal regarding this practice is being put up with the UGC for feasible support in terms financial whereas the college is under consideration to make drain pit in the back yard. There is an old tank which needs to be ready for the drain pit. The drain pit work is under process. The college is under consideration to levelled to trap rain water for ground water regeneration. And even the waste water from the department of Home Economics will be directed through drains to plants for irrigation is also under consideration. The green cover in the college premises will help to harvest rain water.

• Check dam Construction.

Since the College is situated in an urban area, the scope to check dam construction nearby area doesn't exist.

• Efforts for carbon neutrality:

LPG is used in the department of Home Economics which is also carbon neutral. The college is continuing NO Plastic Zone practice. Plastic wastes are carefully disposed off. The college has installed low carbon producing Kirloskar make green generator.

• Plantation:

The students, under the supervision of the NSS unit of the College, ensure to plant a tree in villages. Plantation activity in our college and as well as in nearby villages are consider on top. The College Administration in consultation with the 'Greenfields Club' assures that greenery and trees are properly maintained on the premises. The College is situated in an urban area with no place to carry out plantation works. However, shrubs / small indoor plants are maintained in the College premises. The NSS unit of the College actively conducts green campaigns and has taken the initiative to teach students how to make environment more conducive to healthy living by making it greener. Hazardous waste management:

Plastic Free Zone Campaign is a practice at our premises. In our college hazardous waste is produce less in number. Adequate numbers of dustbins are kept at various places for disposal of wastes. Various environment- related activities, seminars, invited talks, and programmes have been organized by NSS.

• E-waste management:

In order to reduce e-waste the college has taken the following steps:

- There is waste of old few computers and peripherals. Since it is donated it is inevitable to dispose. Therefore, the college has written a letter to the district collector asking his nod to dispose of the same. The college is in opinion to shift these Old PCs to its owned school at Borkhedi village.
- The students are made aware of the hazards of e-waste using audio visual aids.
- An awareness lecture, Seminar on Waste management has been organized.
- Papers used on one side are reused. These initiatives save paper.

Any other --- Classroom to Grassland (Ayurvan – Aura Park)

Classroom to Grassland:

The Greenfields Club has entry into an agreement (MoU) for the student centric activities like visit to Ayurvan; know the plants and its use for health benefits, to plant a sapling at the college, suggestion and etc. The objective behind the same was to understand the students Nature-Conservation and Eco-development, giving awareness about deforestation and global warming, preparing compost pits, planting saplings, visiting the natural eco systems like local water bodies and nearby forests. The areas are assigned to NSS and other departments for planting, watering, dig over and maintaining the plants,

greens and trees; the addition of plants in the college is a joint venture of NSS, Home-Economics and AYURVAN Foundation, Nagpur plays a vital role. Personal experience of sowing seeds, watering plants, preparing and using etc., has ecologically sensitized by the Home-Economics and NSS students.

The AYURVAN Foundation, an NGO having six acres of land and around four hundred plants near Bazargaon, 35 km on Nagpur- Amravati Road, Nagpur confers pleasure and splendid space. The organic farming field as an *Aura Park* educate the students about an ayurvedic as well as botanical aspect of herbs.

The Department of Home Economics and the NSS took an initiative for nurturing this activity among the students and to have an alternate remedy whenever the casualty arises. The department aims to enlighten the students' thorough knowledge of ayurvedic plants taking them from Classroom to Grassland. It inculcates values of the Ayurvedic as well as botanical aspect of herbs. The students are made aware about propagation & cultivation techniques of important medicinal plants.

Best Practice I

Title: Promotion of Women Empowerment

The Elevated Objectives:

- To empowering women to build confidence, courage and strength.
- To liberate the weaker sections of the rural areas from the chains of the permanent, economic, social, political and educational limitation.
- To inculcate social responsibility and commitment in students.
- To bring forth the team spirit and leadership qualities among the students.
- To provide facilities to socio-economically week students for their academic achievements.
- To provide financial aid to students and other necessary solutions to the problems they (women) encounter in general and in particular.
- To encourage the understanding of gender-related issue among the students.

These objectives are achieved through the activities of the Women Empowerment Cell in association with the co - curricular and extension activities.

THE CONTEXT: The Colleges attracts a considerable number of students from suburban as well as urban areas to apply for admission and they get admitted to our college on first come first basis. Unfortunately, on many occasions, poverty and lack of education of the parents compel them to marry off their daughters. In most cases, the in-laws of the married students do not encourage to educate which results in their irregularity and poor attendance.

A majority of the college students are from agriculture / minor farming / daily wage earning and many other survival level occupations happen to be the main stay. Many students from rural/ mofussil areas who join the college inform us that they also help their parents earn their livelihood. These students who entertain hopes of a good future are also the potential drop outs. A part from the State Govt. Scholarships and other concession, the college extends all possible help to such students to enable them to continue and complete their studies. It also aims at providing a friendly environment to determine the girl students 'basic rights to work and study with dignity and free mind. Therefore the college aims, with the help of Teachers' Council, Alumni Association and NSS Unit, takes necessary steps to minimize the abovementioned problems through support provided by different Counselling Sessions.

THE PRACTICE:

Women Empowerment has been a major concern of the College and the various departments of the college have undertaken the following programme:

Counseling of Parents - are provided through Parent Teacher Meet to change their fixed mind set regarding the position of women in society.

Early marriage – are addressed by the individual teachers and the counseling session are conducted thus enabling the married girls to share the hope of a better future.

Awareness Programme - is another noteworthy attempt to Voter Id, Voters Day, Aadhar Card, Health Awareness, Pre-marriage Counselling, Adolescent Problems, *etc*

Gender Sensitisation - Noted Gynaecologists have spoken on sensitive issues relating to Women's Health Risk like Breast Cancer, Malnutrition; Food Adulteration was held / organized by the college. A film show on *The Right to Feel Safe* was screened in the college on Women's Empowerment was arranged by the departments of Physical Education to increase awareness among girls and encourage them to assert their liberty. Students participate in the Seminar on Female Foeticide along with the Physical Education Teacher organised by other college.

Hidden Talents: The College provides opportunities to the students to demonstrate their talents. Collegiate competitions such as debates, essay writing, slogan writing, quiz, Signing, Poster making, flower arrangement, salad, cooking, dance; elocution, drama etc. are organized by the concern department.

Community Based Program: The community based program includes NSS, Health Cell – Ayush, strive to create feeling of patriotism sympathy for the less privileged. The NSS units organize camps at which the volunteers learn not only life skills but dignity of labour also. The NSS volunteers undertake cleanliness drives within the camps & in its periphery thus getting firsthand experience of what it takes to be a manual labour. They learn how to work synergistically with one another and they also discover their leadership potential, the camps also aim at bringing forth the leadership potential of students while teaching them life skills and making them tough for the hard break up called life.

EVIDENCE OF SUCCESS: A positive attitudinal change can be seen among the girl students. Now the students actively take part in all the activities. They are more confidence. They are more aware & sensitized. Now they have become more courageous and stronger to face the challenges of life and they are more aware of their rights. The students who have been a part of this process have been spreading awareness in the institution and motivating others as well to stand fall for the cause of women empowerment and social upliftment. Participation in various socially relevant activities for women empowerment has imbibed, nurtured and enhanced the leadership qualities, Public speaking skills, problem solving ability and sensible attitude of students and these qualities have further inculcated in them a strong sense of their own Individual standpoint in the matters concerned. The our girl students have taken an initiative to make the society aware about social issues like female foeticide, Dowry System, Women's Health, Gender Bias, Environment Protection, HIV AIDS Awareness, Anti Tobacco and Cleanliness Awareness etc. The College organizes classes in painting, dyeing, stitching and using waste material. As a result, some students are now self employed and are earning at own. Some of them are working in the village peripheral industries.

PROBLEMS ENCOUNTERED & RESOURCES REQUIRED: Initial unwillingness of the parents and spouses to initiate the change required for the betterment of the students' learning condition. It is noted that they need courage to express the real problem. The college provides moderate financial assistance to the needy and deserving students by way of scholarships/ cash prizes and other financial assistance. The college library has a Book Bank Scheme which issues text books to economically poor students. The college teachers pay admission fees, university examination fees, Hospitalization Charges and Bus Pass Fee of the students who are not in a position to pay their fees. Due to increase in the cost of education in terms of fees, Notes books, transportation and study material rapidly increasing and poor condition of the family becomes helpless for such students. The financial assistance lacks such students to pursue studies who risk in dropping out.

It is not really possible for the college to generate the resources it requires to help all the students who need such help. The empowerment of women has become one of the most important concerns but it is a long way practice go. The new schemes need to be added for serving women. The position of rural women and those belonging to deprived sections of society need to be empower.
